From the Pastor's Desk **Second Sunday of Easter-** **Divine Mercy Sunday** **April 27-28, 2019**

Dear Families of Holy Family and St. Thomas Parishes,

Today we celebrate the Second Sunday of Easter. This Sunday is also shared with Divine Mercy Sunday, which is the Church's celebration of the personal revelation received by St. Faustina Kowalska, a religious sister of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy in Poland, from the risen Lord that He wanted His message of mercy shared with the world. It is fitting that the Second Sunday of Easter shares its importance with the mercy of God since the greatest miracle known to man is the Resurrection of Jesus from the dead. We focus this Sunday on the mercy of God because it is by His mercy that Jesus offers to us a share in His divine life by our belief that He has saved us from our sins by dying on the Cross. Our salvation is dependent on the fact that we not only follow Jesus by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel that He is risen, but that we trust in His mercy by seeking forgiveness and being repentant of our sins. This Sunday also follows the events that transpired when the disciples gathered in the Upper Room after discovering that Jesus was not in the tomb. Our Lenten observance and

adherence to the prescriptions of the Church to pray, fast, and give alms culminated in our celebration of the Lord's Resurrection from the dead on Easter Sunday.

The Gospel of John recalls the event that happened the evening of the day after the Lord rose from the dead. The disciples are huddled together in the Upper Room trying to make sense of what they witnessed in discovering that the tomb of the Lord was empty. What happened to Jesus? Where did He go? Who took Him from the tomb? If it's true that He is risen, how will He appear to them? Will He come back to them? What will He do when He encounters those who abandoned Him in His time of need or didn't believe that He would truly rise? These were all probable questions they could have been wondering about. But Jesus does appear to them, and simply says to them, "Peace be with you." He doesn't come with condemnation, but a spirit of victory. I did it! I conquered sin and death! Do you believe now? His appearance perhaps caused many different emotions from the disciples; elation, fear, joy, sorrow. I imagine His appearance answered all their questions. There was no doubt that He had risen. Now, what are they to do? Jesus sends them forth, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." He breathed on them, giving them the Holy Spirit. This is what they needed to come out of their slump so that they could continue the mission of Jesus. Part of their mission is to forgive the sins of others.

We see in the Acts of the Apostles that, "Many signs and wonders were done among the people at the hands of the apostles." We see power given to the Apostles to heal the

afflicted. When Peter walks the streets, many people bring the sick to the streets so that even by the casting of Peter's shadow they may be healed. People believed that Peter and the Apostles harnessed great power. They believed in the power of Christ and believed that because the Apostles were the closest to Jesus, they received His power to accomplish the things that Jesus did when He walked the earth. We possess that power too as disciples of Christ. Those who struggle to believe in the power of Jesus see us as those who can show Jesus to them. We should never doubt that we have power to change the hearts of men and women throughout the world. Yes, doubts may still arise, but we have to be resolute to share Jesus with others.

In John's account of the Book of Revelation, we see that John was given a particularly singular mission in writing on the events he recalled as an eyewitness of Jesus' life. He was preserved from death like His fellow Apostles and sent to Patmos to begin his writings. It was also his mission to care for the Mother of Jesus. The Book of Revelation is the most difficult of all the books of the Bible because it contains very profound visions of John in his account of what he has seen of the heavenly kingdom of God. He recalls seeing Jesus in a white robe with a gold sash around His chest. It is a vision of a victorious Christ who has overcome the devil and his weapons of sin and death. Keep in mind that John recalls this vision even before the Lord appeared to the disciples in the Upper Room. He had already witnessed that the Lord was coming in victory. He, like us, is called to share with the world what we know

about Jesus. Yes, we have the scriptures, but Christ is in our hearts. It is a personal relationship with the Lord that we must cultivate in order to share with others what we have seen. No doubt that the vision of St. Faustina regarding the Divine Mercy of Jesus helps us to see that the Lord wants us to know that He does not come to us with condemnation but with mercy.

May we receive the Lord's mercy in all that we do. May we know that we are loved by a loving Savior who desires mercy rather than sacrifice. May this Easter season be a time of true joy for us as we anticipate His second coming in glory to judge us according to His Gospel.

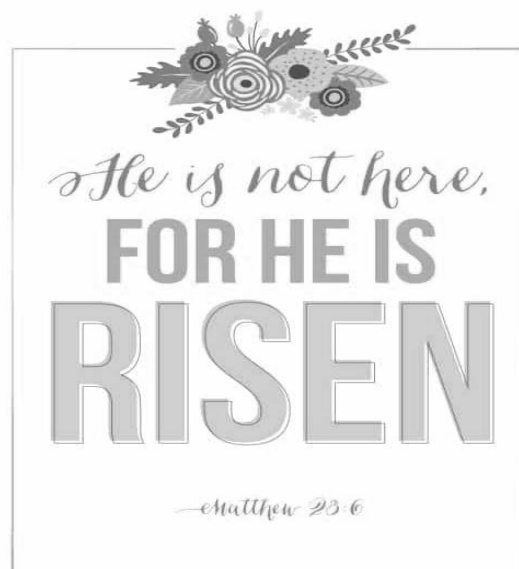
